Louis J. Grillo GER 2005-2006

WELCOME GER, Louis J. Grillo Stockton, California, Lodge # 218 To MD, DE, D.C. Elks Association Spring Conference, Dover Lodge No. 1903 March 24-26, 2006

Louis James "Jim" Grillo was born and raised in Stockton, California. Jim, a fifth-generation Stocktonian, attended Madison Elementary School, Daniel Webster Junior High School, and Amos Alonzo Stagg High School in Stockton. He graduated from California State University in Sacramento, with a degree in Criminal Justice. While in college he interned for the District Attorney's Office.

On February 12, 1974, Jim was proposed for Elks membership by his father, who was then State Vice President of the Central District of the California-Hawaii Elks Association. On a visit home from college, Jim was initiated into Stockton, California Elks Lodge No. 218, on March 26, 1974. He served with distinction in all the Chairs and was to serve as Exalted Ruler for 1987-1988.

Subsequently, in 1991, he was Chairman of the Centennial Celebration for the Stockton Lodge, a celebration which included a visit from then Grand Exalted Ruler James W. Damon. Jim also was the editor of the Lodge's 100-year Commemorative Book, and was instrumental in obtaining television coverage for the Lodge's 100 years of Elkdom on the NBC Today Show. Jim is an Honorary Life Member of Stockton Lodge No. 218.

Jim has been active on various California Central District Committees and has served the Grand Lodge as District Deputy Grand Exalted Ruler in 1991-1992. He served the California-Hawaii Elks Association as State Indoctrination Chairman in 1994-1995, and in 1995 was appointed to serve on the California-Hawaii Elks Major Project Board of Trustees for three years. In 1998-1999, Jim was First Vice-President of the Califomia-Hawaii Elks Association, and he was elected President of the association for 1999-2000.

Jim was on the Grand Lodge-Lodge Activities/ State Associations Committee from 2000 to 2001, and was Chairman of the All-American Lodge Contest during that time. Jim served four years on the Board of Grand Trustees, the general financial agent of the Order and of the Elks National Home. As a Board Member, he was responsible for Building Applications West in 2001-2002; Pension Member in - 2002-2003; and Approving Member in 2003-2004. In July of 2004, Jim was elected Chairman of the Board.

Jim met Lucia Catherine Olivieri at an Elks gathering, and on December 1, 1990, they were married. Since that time, Lucia has been at his side, not only in life, but also in Elkdom. They live on the family ranch in Linden, California, where Lucia was born and raised. They are involved in overseeing the operations of the walnut and cherry orchards that were established by Lucia's father in the early 1920s.

How many of us can scroll back through the pages of our life's story and be able to point to one particular moment and say that that moment was a Life-Changing Moment? It could have been graduation from high school or college. It could have been the birth of a child, or marriage, or a death that was that one defining moment in your life. For me it was Lowell Thomas and a DD clinic he held many moons ago.

I joined the Elks in Frederick (too many years ago to count) for one purpose and one purpose only: to have fun. It was (to me) a social organization. At that time I worked for the Frederick County Health Department and the Elks Lodge was downtown, within easy walking distance of my office for lunch or to stop by after work for a quick game of Gin Rummy. One of the regular players was blind but he could beat the socks off of any three of us on any given day.

I soon began to serve on the House Committee because, hey, they were the people that planned the parties and the dances. How better to meet people and have fun? A Luau in February? What could be better than swimsuits and a beach motif in the middle of winter? It was a ball.

Through many job changes I ended up in Crisfield. Remembering the fun I had in Frederick, I joined the Elks' Lodge there, again to meet people and have fun. And I did. Being a "joiner" I soon ended up "in the chairs" and on my way to becoming an Exalted Ruler. Hey, all I had to do was to "keep it together" until my year was up and then I was done.

Then I met Lowell. I'm sure I had met him before but this was at his DD clinic in Selbyville and I can still see him in the process of lining up all his books and getting ready for the clinic, the sun coming in the window behind him. - Our camp grew from 10 children a week for 6 weeks to 100 children a week for 9 weeks.
- The roof of the Dining Hall was built with timbers of an old barn that was on the property.
- Originally the cabins had screen covered openings with a wooden trap door that closed the opening.
- Meetings were held in the Camp Springs cabin with a kerosene stove to keep us warm.

Years ago on November 11 we placed flowers on the graves. A family member, whose grandfather was in the Civil War, visited the graves and thanked us for caring for them.
- The barn on the property was near the caretakers house. The old swimming pool is under the new bathhouse. The old bathhouse is now the nurses quarters and Directors apartment. The basement has the equipment that operated the old pool.
- The current bathhouse was built in 1990-91. New bathrooms were built at the Dining Hall/Kitchen area in 1992.
