1918: The Elks built a
700 bed hospital in
Boston and donated it to
the federal government,
creating the precursor to
today's VA Medical
Centers.



1946: The Elks
National Veterans
Service
Commission is
established, with
the goal of serving
hospitalized
veterans.

1951: In response to a plea from the Secretary of Defense, Elks help collect over half a million pints of blood.





1997: The Elks again partner with the VA to support Adaptive Sports Events to help recovering veterans and veterans with disabilities stay healthy and active.



2016: The Elks launch the Welcome Home program to help end veteran homelessness.

1917: Elks established a
War Relief Fund to care
for the sick and wounded
on the battlefields of
France. Elks also
organize and equip the
first two base hospitals in
France.





1918-1924: Elks make
40,000 rehabilitation,
vocational and
educational loans to
veterans with disabilities,
a program so successful
it inspires the
government to establish
the GI Bill.

1948: The Veterans Leather Program begins, providing free wheelchair gloves and rehabilitation materials to veterans.

1955: The Elks join the Veterans Affairs Voluntary Service Executive Committee, and hundreds of Elks begin to volunteer at VA facilities.





2011: The ENVSC begins to offer Freedom Grants to help Lodges serve veterans and military members in need in their communities.
