

#### DON'T BE SHY TO PUBLICIZE CHARITABLE EFFORTS.

The Lodge year is now more than half over, so it is a good time to review budget and financial matters. Budgets and financial practices can be revised at any time to reflect changes in circumstances. I want each Lodge to make every effort to maintain a sound financial footing in order to be able to sustain itself for years to come. We owe that to our Members and to our communities.

As a matter of fact, the Lodge Auditing and Accounting Committee is required under our Statutes to conduct a review and make a report to the Lodge concerning its financial condition. Its purpose is to generate discussion as to how to plan for a Lodge's future, and should be taken seriously.

I urge you to make sure your charitable efforts are being properly recorded and reported. For too long there has been a philosophy in many quarters that Elks do good works but don't need the recognition. Well, we do. People take note of the charitable work fraternal organizations do. The Elks have long been recognized as a leader in charitable and benevolent efforts, but in order to keep that standing we need to document the time and treasure we are contributing. It is estimated that only a quarter to a third of reportable donations and time spent are actually reported. It does a disservice to Elkdom to not provide the best information to allow us to promote our brand.

Recognition of those who are at the forefront of civic life is always something to consider. Special events and award ceremonies are wonderful ways to recognize first responders, elected leaders, and others who would likely welcome a pat on the back. Such events are also good ways to introduce our Lodges to the community, and generate interest in others to become Members.

Remember that October is now Red Ribbon Month, during which activities are held to promote the fight against drug abuse. It is a great opportunity for our Lodges to promote our commitment to combating the scourge of illicit drug abuse.

The Great Heart of Elkdom, the Elks National Foundation, deserves the support of every Member. It is a tremendous vehicle that provides funding for so many programs of the Order, including Hoop Shoot, scholarships, grant programs, and other important

You will learn this weekend that most of our programs, projects, etc. are moving along as anticipated and are on track to yield positive year-end results. However, there are still six months to go, and we all must remain diligent in our efforts to ensure that we continue that expected upward trend.

As I am sure you are all aware, a new Financial Reporting System (FRS) for all Lodges was approved at our Grand Lodge Convention in St. Louis on July 2nd. All Lodges are expected to be up and running and using this reporting system by April 1, 2020. Our Auditing & Business Practices Committee lead by Chairman Bill Simonds has taken the lead to work with our Lodges and ensure that they make the April 1, 2020 deadline. I expect all Lodges to be cooperative in this effort and work with the committee to get their individual Lodge compliant no later than the deadline. If you have issues and/or questions, contact Bill or his committee and, if you can't get the answers, you need to contact me.

Congratulations and thank you to all the Lodges and individual Elks who are on board, carrying the load, and moving their Lodge and our Association forward.

**Annual Budget:** A proposed budget will be presented for Advisory and Membership approval at the Conference. This budget was modified to better reflect our income and expenditure line items.

On behalf of the ENVSC, I would like to welcome our honored guests and members all to the MD, DE & DC Elks Association Fall Conference in scenic Ocean City.

I am happy to report that our VAVS Reps continue to support our veterans at the State Veterans Homes and the VA Hospitals in both Maryland and Delaware along with our USOs at Baltimore and Dover. Our VAVS Reps visit their assigned facilities each month and provide comfort items, entertainment, refreshments, and Elk fellowship for our confined veterans.

I am pleased to announce nine of our Lodges received the Freedom Grant. With these grants, the Lodges will help fund Dental Care for veterans at the Homeless Veterans Stand Down in Dover on September 20th. We will also take veterans to local baseball games (and to a Phillies game), assist with clothing for women and children at Home of the Brave Transition Home, and provide cookouts for veterans and staff at Perry Point and Loc Raven VA Hospitals. Several Lodges provided and delivered Welcome Home Kits to homeless veterans moving into new homes.

Special kayaks were purchased for Team River Runner. These kayaks are used by our wounded veterans while rehabbing.

I would also like to recognize and thank USO/Dover VAVS Rep Francis Clauser for providing and presenting 100 PX Gift Cards to the Delaware Army National Guard 198th Signal Battalion at a deployment ceremony held at Delaware State University on Aug 3rd. The 198th Battalion left Dover Air Force Base on August 4th for a one year tour of duty in Kuwait.

The Army of Hope continues to receive requests for assistance. This summer there were requests for assistance for several veterans living in Transition Homes and a veteran with past due utility bills and rent. The Army of Hope sent rent to the Transition Homes who were providing housing to several homeless veterans, while they waited for benefits from the VA and housing from HUD-VASH.

Congratulations to Bowie, Laurel, and Prince Georges County Lodges and five Virginia Lodges for receiving Welcome Home Grants in the amount of \$10.000.00. These grants will provide housing, furniture and Welcome Home Kits for homeless veterans living in the Washington DC and surrounding areas.

## AUDITING AND BUSINESS PRACTICES

Per the State By-Laws, the Auditing and Business Practices Committee will provide advice, counsel and guidance in financial matters of the Association and to the member Lodges upon their request. Over the last six months the committee provided advice to Lodges across the State. In addition to answering requests from Lodges, the Committee has provided training material, briefed at DD clinics, and advised Lodge Auditing and Accounting Committees. If you, or your Lodge has any questions that this committee might be able to help with, please let us know. This committee is here to help; you only need to ask.

This Committee is also coordinating the rollout of the new financial reporting system (FRS) for the State Association. Many hours have been spent attending Morrison & Morrison (M&M) webinars, generating material to supplement the M&M training materials, and working with the Lodges to build the required files. Generating the supplemental material needed to facilitate the transition to the FRS, including a guide for QuickBooks Online, has been a very large task.

The State FRS Coordinator now has access to the Adaptive Insights program to review submissions and reports. As of September 12, six Lodges have provided some information and four of those are completely up and running with the FRS. With 37 Lodges in the State there is more work to be done. As part of this effort, either now or by April 1, 2020, all Lodges are required to convert to the most recent version of the Grand Lodge Standard Chart of Accounts. The Mapping files being created now are a good start on that work. The A&BP committee will be contacting Lodges to learn their status and help with any problems they are having.

There is a two-hour session on the agenda for Lodges to talk to the State FRS Coordinator about the transition. If you have questions or are having problems, or if you just want to learn what other Lodges are experiencing, come to this session. There is no formal presentation planned, just a discussion. You don't have to be there at the start of the session, drop by any time.

## Do you know your state alcohol management laws?

Laws regarding business operations, legal gambling, and alcohol sales vary by state. Knowing the laws and regulations in your city and state are important to your operation.

Because of continuing problems regarding alcohol sales and service, Lodges need to know about responsible alcohol management and the law regarding not serving Visibly Intoxicated Persons, also known by bartenders and servers as VIPs.

Every Lodge should have a written policy instructing servers and managers how to handle most situations that may come up regarding the serving of alcohol. Rules regarding Visibly Intoxicated Persons could help reduce your risk of liability.

First and foremost, servers and managers need to know it is against the law to serve people who are visibly intoxicated. If a Visibly Intoxicated Person gets into, or causes an accident, the server and the Lodge could be held accountable.

Recognizing a person who is visibly intoxicated is not difficult when servers and managers know what to look for. Some signs to notice if someone is intoxicated:

- Acting loud and boastful
- Drinking alone and fast
- Ordering doubles
- Buying round after round for friends
- Crude behavior
- Slurred speech
- Stumbling and bumping into things
- Falling asleep at the bar

These are some of the signs of visible intoxication. As soon as any of these are noticed, the service of alcohol should be stopped immediately.

By knowing your customers and talking with them, you may be able to find out that they are having a bad day. If so, a server might try to slow down their drinking by putting a glass of water in front of them between rounds, getting busy with some task to slow down service, or inviting them to have something to eat.

You should make your policy part of new and continuous employee training. Also, your policy should include filling out Incident Reports for fighting, intoxication, falls, anything your employee did to get the intoxicated person home safely (accepted or not), and anything else that could cause your Lodge a problem in the future. All reports should have a date, time, witnesses, and signature. They should be kept on file for two years.



We are all paying more for insurance coverage because of various problems caused by irresponsible alcohol service. This is a problem we can control through education and responsible Alcohol management programs.

With our Holiday season getting ready to go into full swing, please review with you Bartenders, Serving Staff and Hall Rental Chairs. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me personally.

For the last couple of years, the Welcome Home efforts in our Association continue to aid veterans in our area. Our objective continues to be providing support to the veterans who need assistance to help them settle into a stable homebound environment.

The ENVSC upped the amount of FOCUS grant funding this year to \$10,000 for the 2019-2020 Lodge year. This applies to those Lodges designated as part of the Washington, DC Metro area. At this time, the ENVSC Director has informed me that as of 1 September they have reached their limit of funds for the program. This may change later in the year. Meanwhile, our State Association has funds that can be used to support a veteran anywhere in the State association.

I have coordinated an effort between Virginia Elks and the MD-DE-DC Elks to share FOCUS grant funding to support all veterans in the Washington, DC Metro area regardless of where they live. The VA Elks have supported furniture for 5-6 veterans since they received funding in April. We will reciprocate as funding permits.

As many of you might know, the State Board of Trustees has allocated \$50,000 to the State Association Welcome Home Program. These funds will be available for Lodges across our association to aid local veterans. Send requests to me in writing (so I don't mess up the details) I will then solicit approval of the District Veterans Chairs and the State Chairman.
