Recognize future leaders with JROTC Awards Program

Introduced in 2018, the purpose of the JROTC Awards Program is to allow Local Lodges to recognize our future leaders by focusing the public's attention on outstanding cadets from their communities.

Does your Lodge participate in this program? If not, get involved by following the suggested procedure for setting up a JROTC Awards Program for your Lodge:

1. Locate your JROTC schools by state at the national level through the following websites:

- 2. Contact the schools in your area that have a JROTC program. Ask to speak to the senior instructor to see if they would be interested in participating in the Elks program. If so, request that the instructor select a cadet whom they feel has proven him or herself to be a true leader in academic achievement as well as community service projects, and one who maintains the highest standards of performance in all fields of endeavor. Be sure to coordinate your efforts with other Lodges in your district. You may want to consider making it a district program with all Lodges in your district your Lodge to be an active community participating.
- 3. Inform the instructor that your Lodge will provide them with a certificate and a medal to present to the cadet they select. Your Lodge may want to have

Lodge Officers or Members attend the ceremony to make the presentation to the cadet, if permissible.

- 4. If your Lodge holds a dinner to recognize outstanding youth in your community, you should consider inviting the cadet and their family.
- 5. A printable and fillable JROTC certificate is available on the Grand Lodge website under the Activities Committee at: elks.org/grandlodge/activities/files/ IROTCAwardsProgram.pdf. The IROTC Medal can be ordered from the Grand Lodge Supplies/Shipping Department by using CLMS. The item number is 575300 and the cost is \$10.00 plus shipping and handling. The IROTC medal makes a terrific companion gift to the JROTC certificate. Any cadet will be proud to receive both awards.

The Activities Committee encourages partner and promote our youth programs. Let's increase our efforts to recognize America's outstanding youth in our communities by truly demonstrating that "Elks Care - Elks Share."

Digital pins program allows Members to collect, connect

The long-standing Elks tradition of pin collecting now has an online companion.

In April, the Elks' website added Digital Lodge Pins that can be obtained and swapped at elks.org/games/.

Elks Members can scroll through the list of Lodges and request a digital pin from other Members. To give pins, users can either accept the pin requests they receive, or search a Member by name to give a pin. Every user has a page that displays their digital pin collection.

Users can accumulate or distribute as many pins as they want, without limit. The site has leaderboards that show who has given and received the most digital pins.

Much like trading lapel pins at convention or through the mail, the digital pin program is designed to spark connections.

"We're hoping to increase Member engagement with the website, and also to help Members forge relationships with Elks from other Lodges," said Frederick Mensch, Director of Internet Operations for the Elks and the creator of the pin program. "The feature has caught on way



faster than we expected. In less than two months, Members have already exchanged more than 280,000 digital pins!"

The Digital Lodge Pin program is the latest addition to the Fun 'n' Games section of elks.org. It joins Hello, Bill! Messenger, where users can greet old and new friends, and Magical Mystery Lodge, where players guess letters to reveal the name of a Lodge.

Pauline Talbott of Sebastian, FL Lodge No. 2714 has collected nearly 400 digital pins. She started participating after seeing a post on the Elks message board about it.

"Shortly after starting, I was reading the message boards again and there were more people talking about the digital pins so I began requesting and sending more and more pins," Talbott said. "I started messaging on 'Hello Bill,' introducing myself and requesting they send their digital pin."

The purpose of the pin program has worked as intended for Halbott. She and the leading pin collector, Ronald Holm from Kerrville, TX No. 2081, have started a correspondence and even met in person at the Elks convention in Minneapolis.

"I have been collecting lapel pins but the digital [ones] are much easier to collect countrywide," Talbott said. "It really is a lot of fun."

In addition to swaps, other pins can also be obtained through certain achievements, including passing training or chair quizzes and reaching benchmarks in other Elks online games.

Each Lodge was given a default pin design, but Exalted Rulers can change the shape, emblem, and color of the pins using the Digital Lodge Pin Update Wizard. Or, they can contact the webmaster to create a pin to their specifications.

Let's talk about organ donation. It sounds scary to most of us.

Organ donation is a hard choice to make when a loved one has passed. Oftentimes, the decision should have been made by the donor beforehand, but in some cases, sudden death happens and no plan is in place. Organ donation may be the most difficult decision relatives will ever have to make.

No one has to donate, but it's a wonderful gift—the gift of life—that you can give someone else and their family.

Most of us don't tend to realize how these donations can help others.

Donation of organs, tissue, and eyes can be used for those who are afflicted by muscular degeneration, diabetic retinopathy, and glaucoma.

The lungs and liver are the most sought after and needed. There are more than 113,000 people in the United States waiting for kidneys, livers, and heart transplants.

An average of 20 people a day die because there wasn't a donation that could get to them fast enough.

Another factor is that not having enough donations creates illegal harvesting, buying and selling of organs. When people are dying and desperate, they will do just about anything. These operations with illegal organs are very rarely done in hospitals or clinics, cutting their success rate to less than half.

Many people don't consider the ramifications of organ donation until a family member, loved one, or friend has to find a solution.

I hope this makes you think about how Tissues are also used for stem cells, important donating actually is, and sign that organ donor card today.

The same judging criteria applies to Local Lodge Website Contest. Those who wish to participate must have competed in their respective state contest and having won, should be **submitted** by their State Association before October 1, 2023, to Ronald A. Brooks, GL Fraternal Committeeman.

Local Lodges in states not holding a State Website contest can submit an application to their Area Representative on the Grand Lodge Fraternal Committee. The Area Rep will then select a website winner from that state and submit it to the Website Contest administrator.

Submission of two (2) issues of your state bulletin published between January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023 must be submitted to Contest I Administrator Thomas Fraker by January 15, 2024.

The judging format is similar to the website contests, with the addition of a Typography category under layout with a table of contents, captions, or headlines. Pictorial is added with good use of photographs or graphics.
