Association. Congratulations and thank you to all the lodges and individual Elks who are carrying the load and moving their lodge and our Association forward. Keep up your usual dedicated efforts and this should be another great year for the Association and its 37 lodges.

Membership growth should still be the number one priority of thanks to the dedicated efforts of our our lodges. As an Association, we enjoyed a gain in membership (+236) through the 2017/2018 lodge year, with 23 of our 37 lodges on the plus side – it was an outstanding year from a promises to be an informative and fun membership standpoint. As I write this message the latest membership numbers available for 2018/2019 are as of 9/3/18 and they show 1 lodge on the plus side, 339 individuals waiting to be initiated, an overall delinquency rate of 11% (2163 members), and a overall loss of 1600 members if the lodge year was ended on 9/3. Obliviously we have 7 months to improve on those numbers, but it won't just happen - it will take the dedicated effort of every Elk, every lodge, every District to bring those numbers in line to yield another growth year for our 37 individual lodges and our Association! We need to start the push now – get yourself and your lodge on board and let's make it happen together!!



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GOVERNMENT RELATIONS

A few tips in getting your government officials informed and involved with your lodge:

September:

Plan your Veterans Remembrance Programs for November. Invite a Legislator or a local Government Official to speak or just watch at your Veterans Day Ceremony or Veterans Programs in November. Inform the local news media of your plans.

October:

Check to see if the lodge can be of assistance in helping the elderly and handicapped get to the polls to vote.

November:

Send congratulatory letters to newly-elected and reelected Legislators and local Officials. Enclose charitable records, survey data and other informational material about the Elks.



ACCIDENT PREVENTION / INSURANCE RISK

This is my 1st quarterly newsletter about safety and risk management in your lodges. I sent all the lodges a copy of the Grand Lodge Accident Prevention report. Below are just a few good tips related to seasonal safety in your lodges. Under "Fall Maintenance" most are common sense. A couple that really stand out are smoke detectors and CO2 detectors. We are all guilty of not testing or changing the batteries in our smoke detectors. Assign a person or add this to your safety check list. CO2 detectors are another safety item that gets overlooked. I know many of you have propane for cooking or heat

and use oil for heating. Test those detectors also. Or if you don't have any, perhaps install a few at needed locations.

I know a lot of lodges have volunteers do repairs. If it is a major project, ensure your lodge is covered if a catastrophic accident happens and the person doing the work is covered as well. During the workshop I will give a short presentation on common sense kitchen safety.

FALL MAINTENANCE

Accident prevention also involves maintaining property when the seasons change:

- Securely store deck/patio furniture for the upcoming seasons;
- Make sure that smoke detectors are working and replace if necessary;
- Lodges that heat with gas/LP/oil need carbon monoxide detectors;
- · Remove leaves from roofs, gutters, walkways and parking lots;
- · Drain and store garden hoses for the winter season;
- Lawn sprinkler systems need to blown free of water to avoid frozen pipes in the winter; and
- Have chimneys and flues inspected and cleaned if necessary to minimize the risk of fire.




